
The year is well underway with our Pacific teams hard at work restoring sight.

# Your support has helped us to train over 350 Pacific eye care specialists.

This significant milestone has been achieved in collaboration with our Pacific partners, including Fiji National University, Divine Word University in Papua New Guinea and the University of Papua New Guinea.

The training of eye care graduates, including eye doctors, eye nurses and eye care technicians, is integral to increasing access to quality eye care for people throughout the Pacific.

Dr Carole Poloso is one of the 350 trained graduates, and now works at the Regional Eye Centre in Honiara, Solomon Islands. She travels regularly to the outer islands on outreaches, as a lot of people who live there don't have the means to travel to the main island.

She spoke of a former employee who developed cataracts and had to quit his job and return to his home province. His eyesight worsened to the point that he had to be led everywhere and cared for every day:

"From working in Honiara to not being able to help himself and being cared for by his family.

It doesn't seem like much. But to them, being able to turn that around and help the family and put bread on the table again – that's a big thing for them.

"It's not just about being able to see but being able to provide again. We performed cataract surgery on him and he walked home after that."

### Your generosity is helping to inspire the next generation of humanitarians.

The annual Humanity Awards were created to recognise young New Zealanders who, just like our founder Fred, strive to make the world around them better and embody the values of compassion, integrity, and kindness.

Madison Macmillan was named the 2022 Humanity Awards' Junior Ambassador for her big picture thinking and generosity. Madison has been fundraising since pre-school. She spends time at home writing, having penned and published her first book by the age of seven. From the hundreds of books she has sold, Madison has donated over \$1,200 to the Northland Rescue Chopper Service.

The Awards are going from strength to strength, and we receive dozens of inspirational nominations every year. Madison was surprised by comedian Rhys Mathewson at her school in Whangarei when he turned up with a film crew to help announce her win, which later aired on current events show, Seven Sharp.

The 2023 Humanity Awards are set to kick off in July.





### You're helping us to strengthen eye care systems in the Pacific.

In collaboration with the University of Auckland, The Foundation aims to support the development of locally driven research through a new and ambitious research programme, 'State of Eye Health in the Pacific'.

The programme intends to develop the kind of evidence-based research that Pacific governments and decision makers need, in order to establish eye health plans and policies that will strengthen and sustain their eye health systems for the long term. Key to the success of the programme will be the engagement of eye nurses who will lead the research activities in their respective countries.
